BURIAL

MONUMENTAL GRAVES

These graves allow for the installation of a solid and impressive stone monument that covers the length and breadth of the grave in place of grassed lawn. Usually made from granite or marble, these monuments are created in conjunction with your choice of stonemason.

VAULT GRAVES

Vaults are special graves that are fully lined with concrete walls and floor allowing for the coffin to be encapsulated and protected from direct contact with the earth. Like monumental graves, they also have the capacity to accommodate a solid and impressive stone monument.

LAWN GRAVES

Keilor Cemetery is due to be expanded to the land opposite the Administration building on Ely Court. Planning for this new development commenced in 2015 and will see the release of new lawn graves over the course of 2016/2017.

THE MULTICULTURAL CEMETERY

Keilor Cemetery was established as the final resting place for the early pioneers of the growing colony, and for those who travelled to the goldfields of Ballarat and Bendigo. It has strong links to our rural and gold mining heritage, with the first burial taking place in April 1856.

The multicultural character of Keilor Cemetery has in recent years distinguished it from most other country cemeteries. Since World War II, suburban and industrial growth and an influx of migrants from Europe and Asia have flavoured the cemetery with a multicultural mix of monument styles.

In 1960, Fr Basil Valentin, a Slovenian priest, bought land at Keilor Cemetery to provide a burial place for the Slovenian community, which had established roots in Keilor, St Albans and Sunshine. A Slovenian church ceremony is held here every year to mark All Saints' Day, when the dead are honoured by the lighting of candles and the decoration of their resting places.

KEILOR MAUSOLEUM

Keilor Mausoleum is a special place where people from all religions and cultural backgrounds come together in harmony. It represents modern Australia, where different traditions are faithfully honoured. This single-storey mausoleum features a weather-protected entrance, a courtyard, impressive colonnades and a chapel-like area providing a stately and reflective setting that appeals to families.

Set in stunning contemporary surroundings, the crypts are arranged over six levels and feature marble shutters and trims, lights and individual

vases, and are finished with individual bronze epitaphs. From the bluestone — paved courtyard to the detailed metal artworks lining the walls, fine finishes and innovative detail are a keynote of the complex. Light-filled spaces, calming reflective pools and individual seating areas create a comforting environment where families can reflect and remember.

KEILOR MAUSOLEUM EXTENSION/S

In late 2014, preliminary planning for the extension of Keilor Mausoleum began with the initial concept design for Stages 4, 5 and 6. Stage 4

will feature an extension of the existing mausoleum building with Stages 5 and 6 being designed as wing extensions branching off each side of stage 4. These three developments will increase the total capacity of the mausoleum by approximately 2000 casket spaces.
